<u>To complete enrollment we also need</u> the following:

- ♦ Medical or insurance card
- ♦ Up-to-date immunization certificate
- Doctor's statement if your child has any allergies
- ◆ Complete dental exam including cleaning and fluoride
- Vision Test (must be done by an Optometrist)
- Any records from previous school
- Social security numbers of all family members
- ◆ A complete physical including: Hearing test HCT or Hemoglobin Lead Test Blood Pressure Height and Weight

What is Head Start?

Head Start is a non-profit organization, serving children age three to five that are income eligible. A child must turn three by August 1 to be enrolled unless they are pre-diagnosed with a disability.

Our Head Start Curriculum is aligned with School Readiness Goals, the Kentucky Early Learning Standards and Outcomes Framework. Developmental screening and assessment instruments include the Brigance Screener, Teaching Strategies Gold Assessment and Ages & Stages Social/Emotional Screening. Middle Kentucky Head Start also uses the Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) to monitor teacher/child interaction, classroom climate, quality of feedback, etc.

We participate in the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) and all meals are served in accordance with federal law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) guidelines. This institution is prohibited from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, or disability.

- ♦ Age appropriate activities to encourage individualized learning for all children
- ♦ Bus transportation for all children, with bus monitors to supervise the children
- ◆ Free breakfast, lunch and p.m. snack that meets all CACFP guidelines, modifications are made for children with special dietary needs
- We collaborate with the Local Boards of Education who provide developmental intervention, speech/language therapy, and physical therapy for children diagnosed with special needs
- ♦ We collaborate with Kentucky River Community Care (KRCC), the local mental health facility to identify and provide needed services to children and their families
- We encourage parental input on weekly thematic units, menus, and field trips
